CONCEPTION ...

For the first time in our history a movement for social change in Cleveland feels real.

Summer, 1968: a Movement for a Democratic Society office opens, attracting hundreds of people. High school students, from all parts of the city, begin to meet. College students prepare for the fall. Kids working with Project Pride plan organizing on the west side. Draft resistance union continues a political counseling service and expands its anti-draft action program. Organizers experiment with middle class organizing: radical young adults, medical students, welfare workers. As the summer ends, many Cleveland people go to Chicago to challenge the legitimacy of the Democratic Party Convention, and are met by

the no longer invisible police state.

And now it is fall, 1968. The events of the summer brought many new people into the movement, which we could define as the creative energy of young men and women struggling for radical social change in America.

The growth of the movement has created new problems. Communication within the movement is difficult: organizers have trouble keeping abreast of movement activities. Conflicting political views emerge: a greater variety of political experiences has lead to differing approaches and analyses.

The problems pose exciting challenges to the Cleveland movement. Can we develop intramovement communication between, for example, high school kids and draft resistance organizers, while preserving the integrity of each group? Can we focus and enrich political debates in a way that sharpens our critical thinking and forces us to develop criteria for evaluating our own work?

During the summer <u>US</u> served as an intergroup communication for the embryonic Cleveland movement. As the movement is maturing, many people have expressed interest in an expanded newsletter. We are now ready for The BIG US.

We hope to provide three functions:

l. information:

calendar of events: meetings, interesting political and cultural events

news items

useful tidbits: recipes, medical advice, etc.

available services: literature, films, etc. other announcements.

2. news about groups in the movement: current, brief accounts of various movement activities, including programs and projects of each constituency group:

Where we're at

MDS held its first Town Meeting Sunday, September 15. Its purpose was to describe to newcomers the achievements of the summer and to discuss fall programs. Each constituency presented their agenda for the fall, but no definite plans were made for MDS as a whole. However, a temporary coordinating committee was established to meet our immediate needs, such as maintaining the office, communication between groups, fundraising, etc.

At the first meeting of the coordinating committee a list of the different administrative jobs requiring immediate attention was discussed. Each coordinating committee member assumed work responsibilities and will seek volunteers for these jobs from his own constituency.

A temporary secretary and an emergency coordinating committee of four was chosen. The secretary, Jimmy Staats, will plan the agenda, see that assigned jobs are done, and convene the emergency committee when necessary.

The emergency committee—Jimmy Staats,
Charlie Tabasko, Paul White, and Tim Wallace
—is responsible for all decisions which have
to be made between regular coordinating committee meetings. For instance, informing groups
of a proposed demonstration and calling a
meeting if necessary.

The coordinating committee will meet regularly on Thursdays, at 7:30 pm, in the MDS office. Meetings are open.

3. political dialogue: countless ideological disagreements exist which we rarely discuss productively. Our need is to create political discussion which involves people: to involve people it must be relevant to their work or experience. We want people to write articles on controversial topics to stimulate political dialogue within the movement.

What are the important questions which the movement must face? The following list is merely suggestive of the range of issues:

**analysis:

- -Is the working class the most important agent of change?
- -Is the university a model of corporate liberalism?
- -Can white radicals play any role in the struggles of the third world?
- -Can white radicals criticize the black liberation struggle?
- -Does the new technology render traditional Marxist thought irrelevant?
- -How does the military-industrial complex rule Cleveland?

**strategy:

- -Can a middle class movement organize working class consciousness?
- -Reform vs. revolution?
- -Revolution: violent or nonviolent?
- -Working within institutions to create meaningful change?

**lifestyle:

...jobs/careers/professions...parents... marriage...sex...children...drugs...cooperative living ... money (how to get it and what to do with it?)

**vision:_

What do we want the New Society to look like...socialism?...freedom through planning?...anarchy for 200 million people?...

These questions can be tackled in a number of ways, through the use of The BIG US. The organizing of constituency groups should be critically evaluated. For example, student organizing: do you organize at CWRU around student power or around work conditions of

nonprofessional employees? Young adult organizing: is it possible to be a "radical" within a profession? Other articles should evaluate political actions: for example, what effect does an anti-Humphrey demonstration have, on the movement, on liberals, on the right?

Communication should take varied forms. Experimental media are encouraged, such as photo essays, poetry, movie or book reviews, political fairy tales.

Finally, we view The BIG US as a voice of the Cleveland movement which can speak to the many potentially interested people in Cleveland.

west side

Most of the west side is a white, working class, ethnic neighborhood, with an increasing nonwhite population on the near west side.

This fall organizing on the near west side will emphasize youth. There are two major youth projects: a newspaper aimed at drop-outs and high school students; and a drop-in center which will be a place to meet neighborhood kids.

COPE House (Coffee, Opportunity, People, Education), an adult organizing project, has begun. Its focus is the Free University of the Streets. The Free University is an experimental educational venture, in which people learn and/or teach whatever they want and need.

West side organizers are continuing to work in and with city groups such as the Poor People's Partnership, Council of Churches Metropolitan Affairs Commission (MAC), and the West Side Residents for Better Health Services.

CLEVELAND: Sunday, September 22, 200 anti-war demonstrators greeted Humphrey at the Cleveland Sheraton Hotel. Protestors also greeted him at Euclid Beach, where he addressed the Democratic Party Steer Roast....Ron Lucas, a local black organizer, was arrested and later charged with carrying a concealed weapon. He is currently out on bond.... The trials of the Cleveland people who were arrested during the Convention in Chicago have been continued.... TAKE NOTE: George Wallace is scheduled for a Cleveland appearance Saturday, October 5. Tentative time: between 3-5 pm....Thomas and Marjorie Melville -- a couple who helped destroy draft records in Cantonville, Maryland--will be speaking at Strosacker Auditorium, CWRU, Saturday, October 5, at 8:30 pm, sponsored by the Cleveland Catholic Peace Movement ... A 20-year-old Clevelander, David Nickerson, was sentenced to an indefinite period in a youth correctional center, after refusing induction...A new movie theater, showing silent films, opens in Cleveland October 3, at 12300 Mayfield Rd. It's the Olde Mayfield, 229-3232 for information....MILWAUKEE: Fourteen persons were arrested and charged, in connection with the recent ceremonial burning of local draft records....FORT HOOD: Five black soldiers were court-martialed, and found guilty on charges stemming from their refusal to accept anti-riot duty during the Convention. A Clevelander, Pvt. Williams H. Avery, 19, was one of the convicted ... MEXICO CITY: Police and armed troops have been ordered in, adding to the repression and injustice which has sparked the current student revolution. A number of casualties has been reported.... REMINDER: Wednesday, October 2, George Wallace will travel by motorcade to Akron at 10 am, to Canton at 12 noon, to Alliance at 3 pm, and Youngstown in the evening ... House Unamerican Activities Committee (HUAC) is beginning hearings on the Chicago demonstrations in Washington on October 1. Tom Hayden (National Mobilization Committee) and Jerry Rubin (Yippies) have already been subpoenaed....TO BE READ: Look, October 1, 1968, on "Campus Guerrillas." October issue of Esquire, on "barbarians, not radicals." Newsweek, Sept. 30 , on campus revolutionaries and a profile of Tom Hayden.... BEWARE: The FBI is in town, trying to talk to people about the Democratic Convention and violations of the anti-riot law. Suggestion: honesty is not always the best policy, but silence is always golden. It is of the utmost importance that people refuse to speak to the Feds....

Two projects for the year are continuations of community involvements, begun this summer, acound medical problems: Near West Side health center and Mt. Sinai Hospital. But most organzing will be aimed at confronting and challenging he administration and curriculum policies of professional schools.

Programs include: increased black student admissions; establishment of a study group on health care delivery; a counter-curriculum that attempts to teach the social aspects of medicine; and seminars on "doctors and the draft."


