Sources for Research

This bibliography will not necessarily be of immediate help to projects, but like other on-going research in ERAP, should be recorded and filed until the situation develops in which it can be used. I am currently writing an article on the structure, membership and possibilities for local 46 of the International Union of Laundry, Dry Cleaning and Dye House Workers (Ind.)

The following is a list of Congressional hearings on "labor racketeering". I came across the various hearings in an investigation of the Laundry Workers International Union. The LWIU is a small union, and information had been almost impossible to get. Using the Catalogue of Government Documents. I not only found information on the LWIU, but also found a new source of information on unions.

In the period 1950-1965, the Congressional hearings into labor activity have been of three types: 1) investigation of communist infiltration into labor unions 2) "emergency" investigations of labor management disputes under the Taft Hartly Law, and 3) investigations of labor "racketeering".

The third kind of investigation offers the most information. The hearings on communist infiltration are not about the unions, but about the past associations of union officials. The emergency investigations are concerned with the insand outs of pension schemes, seniority, etc. Also, they are confined to the transportation industries, such as shipping, air, and railroads.

Most of the hearings, particularly the McClellan hearings, are on Jimmy Hoffa and the Teamsters. A lesser amount of information is on such unions as Laundry Workers, Bakery and Confectionary, Distillery Workers, Operating Engineers, and Vending Machine Service Employees. However, in the eighty odd volumes below, there is an abundance of material which may be of use to you.

Interestingly, some of the hearings on labor "racketeering" are simply politically motivated. For instance the hearings on the UAW vs Kohler is no question of crime. It is more an attempt to rub the smear of "racketeering" on the UAW to break its long strike on Kohler.

Two impressions from the hearings: 1) The question of union democracy or tyranny is in no way involved, only the question of criminally dishonest acts like bribery, extortion, fraud. Although they are certainly problems, it is an interesting commentary on the American Congress that no one is concerned with union democracy. 2) There is a great problem of "racketeering" in unions, and the Teamsters is the worst. From the hearings, you can get an impression of the extent and types of racketeering, but only when you get involved in the local situation, for instance the Laundry Workers in Chicago, can you begin to hate it. It's a real problem, when you work locally, for liberals and radicals alike.

WATERFRONT INVESTIGATIONS:

These were the hearings that sparked On the Waterfront. Kickbacks, shape-ups tell part of the story of the rackets on the docks.

WELFARE AND PENSION FUND INVESTIGATIONS: The hearings were held both by the House Committee on Education and Lebor and the Senate Committee on Labor and Public Welfare. It finally resulted in the Welfare and Pension Fund and Disclosure Act of 1958.

Further, these hearings are the major source of information on the Laundry Workers, Bakery and Confectionary Workers, Distillery Workers, and Allied Industrial Workers.
